

Did you know?

Service-learning is defined as engages students in community service activities with intentional academic learning goals and opportunities for critical reflection that connect to their academic disciplines.

“Service-learning” was first initiated in 2000 when national expert Edward Zlotkowski came to USF and implemented training sponsored by the Center for 21st Century Teaching Excellence and taught a core group of faculty that was already familiar with pedagogy.

USF is one of only 40 public research universities nationwide with very high research activity that is designated as community engaged by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

At the 2015 Awards Gala, USF was chosen Engaged Campus of the Year as Florida Campus Compact focuses attention on building students’ citizenship skills and effective community partnerships.

90% of faculty teaching service-learning courses implemented it based on personal interest in organization/community.

87% of faculty teaching service-learning courses believe it greatly benefits students’ interpersonal skills.

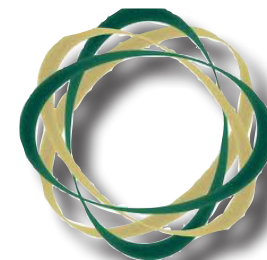
Jo Averill-Snell, Research Administrator

WHAT WE DO

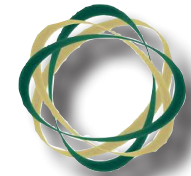
